# A CHILD FOCUSED JOINT PARENTING **COACHING GRANT PROGRAM**

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1. Project Title: BeH2O A Child Focused Joint Parenting Coaching Program

#### 2. Project Narrative:

Kansas Alliance for Non-Profits (KAN) is a 501(c)(3). Its mission is to strengthen nonprofits & support collaborative solutions in Kansas. KAN is the fiscal sponsor for The Layne Project, Inc (TLP), as TLP moves towards obtaining 501(c)(3) to extend its reach to families without the resources to access its first in class, innovative, comprehensive and trauma-informed array of services. This project aligns with KAN's mission by assisting with grassroots initiatives and addressing community challenges.

TLP's mission is safeguarding childhoods through fostering family connections. The best predictor of whether children fare well during and following parental separation is the duration and degree of conflict. Conflict is natural and inevitable, but combat is optional.

The American Bar Association defines Divorce Coaching as a dispute resolution process, "a flexible, goal-oriented process designed to support, motivate, and guide people going through divorce to help them make the best possible decisions for their future, based on their particular interests, needs, and concerns." https://www.americanbar.org/groups/dispute\_resolution/

The Johnson County Kansas Family Court Pathways Project explores triage and differentiated case management in domestic relations court. "Family courts have a monumental task. Judges and staff are asked to help families navigate a legal system not designed to resolve family disputes....The Pathways Project sorts cases into management tracks aiming to deliver







the right services to the right families at the right time." Johnson County, Kansas Pathways Project.

Early interventions have many benefits for the court, for the parties and for the children. Johnson County Court's efforts are a part of a larger national effort. The Institute for the Advancement of the American Legal System (IIALS), the Family Justice Initiative FIJ), and the Cady Initiative all published reports focused on improving family court process and outcomes. In the fall of 2022, a group of judges, family law attorneys, alternative dispute and mental health professionals, and other partners met to discuss ways to improve the family court and its process. In the Spring of 2023 Johnson County Courts introduced the Pathway Triage System. Within this system, through an initial questionnaire cases screen for Pathway 1 if the parties report that they have no disputes; for Pathway 3 if any of the following are present IPV, DV, protection orders, law enforcement involvement, alleged substance misuse, mental health issues, resist and refuse dynamics, long distance parenting plans, a party is pregnant, a third party is claiming custody or parenting time, or requests for ex parte temporary orders are made, and Pathway 2 if they neither fall in Pathway 1 nor 3. From Spring 2023 to Spring 2024, of 1788 cases 34.4% or 615 families fell into Pathway 3.

The goal of the Pathway Triage System is to have a final pretrial conference within 150 days of filing and a trial within 180 days of filing. A future goal is to implement a Pathway 4 for certain post decree matters. Pathway 4 is intended to provide an early opportunity to order the right services to the right families at the right time.

Time is often the enemy of effective interventions. Swift action, comprehensive and







intensive parent education, in combination with innovative trauma-informed programming and coaching are necessary to achieve lasting and impactful changes for these families. Providing all families access to a transformational alternative dispute option such as BeH2O will help reduce the duration and collateral damage of litigation, help the courts to effectively deliver better outcomes for families, improve court efficiencies and increase court user satisfaction.

Our courts can do what is necessary to get the right families, the right services, at the right time; however, if the families do not have the financial means to access these services it is all for naught. In Johnson County, KS or other surrounding counties there is no comprehensive, intensive alternative dispute resolution process or program available to families at free or reduced rates, as such families have no true access to justice.

TLP was established in 2008, and since that time has served families in Johnson County and surrounding counties. In 2015, TLP began teaching an eight-week co-parenting curriculum and ran the program for nearly five years. After receiving feedback from participants, the eightweek program was rewritten by Trina Nudson in 2020 and TLP began offering BeH2O which combines psychoeducation, co-parenting coaching, and alternative dispute resolution. TLP has served approximately 150 families through BeH2O over the past four years.

BeH2O is a sixteen-week child focused joint parenting coaching program, that includes, includes joint, individual, and group meetings, and child inclusion, and provides collectively forty-six hours of psycho-education, and coaching to families, ultimately providing an opportunity for coparents to constructively resolve conflict and end litigation related to child custody and parenting time. Given the level of involvement and comprehensive nature of the







program, there is a significant initial cost investment of \$3500.00, but ultimately, the overall benefits and cost savings to the families and the judiciary is far more. This proposal will allow families to access this program despite their financial means, as well provide necessary research to support the growth of this program throughout the Kansas courts and beyond.

## 3. Project Design

#### A. Implementation Plan

**PHASE ONE** July 2024: upon receiving approval for the grant, TLP will immediately notify Johnson County, Wyandotte County, Leavenworth County, Miami County, and Douglas County domestic courts of the grant funding available and eligibility requirements, as well as provide a form order for Judges to complete and submit to TLP administration upon ordering BeH2O. TLP will finalize research questionnaires with Professor Karey O'Hara of Arizona State University (ASU) who has agreed to research BeH2O.

**PHASE TWO** August 2024: the first BeH2O grant funded class will begin August 19. TLP will submit research questionnaires to and complete intakes for all participants in the August 19 class. TLP will begin the first grant funded class. **PHASE THREE** (ongoing): TLP will start classes every eight (8) weeks, and by December 2024, TLP will have initial research results for the first BeH2O grant funded class, and by February 2025 TLP will have results for the second grant funded class.











PHASE FOUR: April 2025 Professor Karey O'Hara and Trina Nudson will coauthor and publish research article identifying the results of the research.

**PHASE FIVE** May 2025 Trina A. Nudson and Karey O'Hara will present research and model for BeH2O at the National AFCC Conference.

PHASE FIVE June 2025 TLP will offer a training to other jurisdictions and providers on how to implement BeH2O within their own jurisdictions.

#### B. Management Structure

Kansas Alliance for Non-Profits (KAN) is fiscal agent of The Layne Project, Inc. The Layne Project, Inc will administer the grant. Trina A. Nudson owns The Layne Project, Inc and will be personally responsible for administrating the Program along with her team of administrative staff, Amy Piccini who has been employed by The Layne Project, Inc as an office manager since September 2022. My companies run on EOS and our company culture has been transformed through the Arbinger Institute. I am the chair of the Johnson County Bar Association Family Law Section. I have created and presented local and national workshops, as well as created a discussion guide that accompanies the Tommy film written and produced by Darren Mort and utilized within the Australian Family Court system. I thrive on creativity, high energy, face paced, and do not buckle under pressure. I grow through adversity and see challenges as an opportunity for growth. - 5. Project Alignment with Priority Areas:

Projects that propose innovative alternative dispute resolution strategies to aid in early







resolution of Kansas district court cases.

Coaching is on the innovative cutting edge of Alternative Dispute Resolution. BeH2O seeks to lead to not only early resolution but also proactively addressing the "frequentflyer" to litigation phenomenon in domestic cases.

- **6.** What Type Of Cases Will This Project Address: Specifically, this grant will address domestic cases where child custody is at issue.
- 7. Is This a New Project: This is not a new project in that The Layne Project, Inc created BeH2O in 2020 and has served over a hundred families since that time. It is new in that we have not had a grant funded program to allow true access to justice by providing the program to those families who cannot afford it, and though we have done research in house, this project will be researched by Arizona State University.
- **8.** Operation of Similar Project: The Layne Project, Inc has been running BeH2O since July of 2020, and prior to that ran an eight-week coparenting program from 2015 – 2020. In house research asked 67 participants to BeH2O, to compare their co-parenting relationship before and after completing the BeH2O program. Before completing the program, 40.3% of the participants described their co-parenting relationship as "extremely hostile," 16.4% "hostile," 10.4% "moderately angry," 26.9% indicated "avoidant," and 4.5% as "cold." One participant described their coparenting relationship prior to the program as civil and no one described it as friendly. Upon completing BeH2O, 7.5% described their coparenting relationship as "extremely hostile,", 14.9% "hostile," 4.5% "moderately angry," 20.9% "avoidant," and 10.4% indicated "cold." The results showed 34.3% of participants now described their coparenting relationship as "civil" and 7.5% as friendly. TLP is also currently offering BeH2O at low or no cost to families in need contingent on available funding and are in the process of sending two families through the program at no cost. This is funded through private donations.
- 9. What Eligibility Criteria Will Apply to Determine Who Will Receive Services Through Your Project: The District Court Judges will determine which domestic court cases would qualify to receive BeH2O at no cost. To qualify for access a parent must make 150% of the poverty level.
- 10. How Many People Do You Expect to Serve Through This Project During the Grant **Period**? 30 families/ 60 parents
- 11. If There is a Greater Demand For Project Services Than You Can Meet, What Criteria Will You Use to Prioritize Who Receives Services? We will start a waiting list, increase









class sizes, hire more facilitators, solicit more donations from the community, and begin new classes every six to eight weeks.

- **14.** How Will Your Project Results Be Evaluated? Professor Karey O'Hara of ASU has committed to evaluating the implementation and outcomes of the BeH20 program. Her role will include using a single-case experimental design to rigorously assess the program's effects on child and parent health and wellness. This evaluation will not only provide critical feedback for ongoing program refinement but also contribute to the broader knowledge base regarding effective interventions for families in distress. In addition, TLP will track families rate of resolution of pending issues without the necessity of a trial after the conclusion of BeH2O.
